We collaborated on research questions in our September workshop

• 2022 09 21 Leaving the Academy

We collaborated on survey design in our October workshop

We released our survey and got 210 responses! That's a huge success, especially considering how time consuming answering our survey was! Go team!

• We will briefly show the findings in Tally (especially the demographic split)

Collaboration tasks moving forward

- Data cleaning for public dataset release
 - o Scrub the data to lower the risk that folx can be identified
 - Internally we'd like the data cleaning to be done by **February 11** to enable us to share the data internally more freely
 - Eventually, this dataset will be released publicly as part of our project writeup.
 This work will be hugely helpful in reaching that goal.
- Data analysis for first OPA writeup
 - Answering the research question we will discuss today. (More in a minute)
- Writing OPA writeup telling folks about our project, how to use the dataset, and sharing some insights from the analysis.
 - o Ideally, towards a tentative March 11 deadline for a first, simple writeup.
 - Overview of what we did
 - How to use this dataset
 - o Short writeup based on the analysis we do for a simple, discrete research question.
- Iterate: work on new writeups that dive into specific, discrete research questions we have and want to answer.

Mindset: Quick, anti-perfectionist & iterative

- Data analysis is extremely <u>labor intensive</u>.
- Scope creep is a really hard challenge for collaborative research projects like this
- We have insights to share for a tentative March writeup.
- **Something > Nothing.** We are trying to intentionally move ourselves out of the academic tendency to over perfect and to go deeper.
- We will not be answering all of the community's amazing research questions for this March writeup.
- Instead, we hope to keep **iterating** on the analysis work as a community:
 - Beyond March, we hope to keep releasing new short, self-contained write ups that tackle research questions we find interesting.

Making it your own: For this first round: we will experiment with how much room there is
for folks to make data analysis their own even when we've restricted our focus to a specific
research question.

Using Taguette [0:20-0:30]

About this project:

- We're starting by qualitatively coding one of the answers to one of the questions in the survey: "What advice would you give someone who is considering leaving academia?"
- We split the answers into three groups, folks who identified as having a degree in
 - o STEM (71 responses)
 - o Social Sciences (84 responses)
 - Everyone else (Arts, Humanities, Professional and Other (only a handful were professional/other; **Mostly humanities** 65 responses out of 76.)
- Our research question is:
 - What type of advice do folks who have left academia give and does that advice differ depending on the field (STEM vs Social Science vs everyone else?)
- Let's walk through how to use Taguette!

Group Tagging [0:30-0:45]

You'll be assigned a group to go through responses. As a group, your task is to code the answers to the best of your ability.

- One person in the breakout group should share their screen to make it easier for everyone to follow.
- Pick a chunk of text that hasn't been tagged.
- If you feel that you need a new tag/code, create it. Please use an underscore _ before the tag, so that we know it is new.
 - Example: We need a new code that refers to Discrimination in the academy, you write a description and call that tag "_Discrimination"
 - We are asking for this because each of the other groups will also need to go through and see if they have this same tag.
- Repeat!

- Someone said I don't know! That's fascinating. What PhD doesn't have an opinion on career advice?
- Felt very fast
- Felt adjacent to grade norming (trying to create consistency in a rubric.)
- Important code (added! Thank you)

- Knowing that there is going to be info that will be relevant of this question in other answers and other stages of analysis.
 - E.g. what does "now" mean (e.g. in "leave now")
 - E.g. For someone who says I don't know, have they answered the question in one of their other answers to the survey?
- Color coding (some software support it; MaxQDA; AtlasTI
